1. Aaron and Kirsten Farago re: Food truck by-law

Aaron Farago commented on the following items:

- Item 3.1 would allow two food trucks in the Village which he feels is excessive and is concerned with oversaturation. As the Village is concerned of exclusivity, could Council consider it on a case-by-case basis possibly change the wording to have a maximum of one food truck or put it on a case-by-case basis.
- Item 3.5 the by-law allows additional food trucks for Special Events for less than four days. He asked if this could be at the discretion of Council as this could take away from full-time restaurants. Councillor Moore advised that the Special Events Committee is very careful to ensure that any food trucks for Special Events do not infringe on the restaurants.

- Mayor Hope advised that he thought the old Village office may be salvageable. There are a lot of papers and books from the Fire Department that need to be removed and the carpet is in bad shape. He will bring it to the attention of the Fire Chief.
- The backhoe attachment for the tractor was discussed.
- Forbes Park Caroline Miller was present and expressed various concerns relating to the Park. The parking and garbage were out of control last year. She tried to clean the beach every day. The parking was dangerous. Golf carts and four wheelers would drive on and over the boardwalk. Wooden beams were placed last year in an effort to stop this from happening but they were driving on and over the beams. They also started using the entrance from the sewage plant. Council recommends that the parking be delineated and barriers be placed to restrict golf carts or other motorized bikes. Signage is required.

Check off the end-of-life electronics you uncover on the list below. You may be surprised at just how much you discover.



Display Devices

Televisions and monitors, including various technologies such as Cathode Ray Tube (CRT), All-in-one, flat panel (LCD, LED and plasma) and rear projection.



Non-Cellular Telephones

includes corded and cordless telephones, as well as telephone answering machines.



Home Audio/Video Systems

Includes VCR, DVD and CD players, speakers, amplifiers, receivers, digital projectors and similar audio/video systems.



Desktop Computers

Desktop computers (including those acting as servers).



Portable Computers

Includes portable computers such as laptops, netbooks, notebooks and tablets.



Computer Peripherals

Includes both wired and wireless manual input devices such as keyboards, mice and trackballs.



Desktop Printers/Multi-Function Devices

Printers designed to reside on a work surface, including laser and LED, inkjet, dot matrix, thermal, dye sublimation and "multi-function" copy, scan, fax and print devices. Stand-alone desktop scanners and fax machines are also included in this category.



Personal or Portable Audio/Video Systems

Includes docking speakers, portable stereos, personal CD players, portable audio recorders, tape/radio players, dig tal media (MP3) players, voice recorders, digital cameras and video cameras.



Home Theatre In-A-Box (HTB) Systems

Includes pre-packaged disc player/speaker/amplifier systems for use with video or television display to create a home theatre experience.



Vehicle Audio/Video Systems (aftermarket)

Includes amplifiers, equalizers, speakers and audio/video components.



Cellular Devices and Pagers

Cellular phones, including those offering camera, video recording and/or audio functions, smartphones (cell-enabled), cell-enabled PDAs utilizing touch-screen technology, and cell-enabled handheld devices.
